FASTER OBSERVANCE CONTINUES

In the Christian assemblies Easter is celebrated for a "week" of Sundays. We continue to lift up the resurrection of Jesus as we live out of the Three Days liturgy for seven Sundays. While Lent is important with 6 Sundays, Easter is even more significant with a perfect 7 Sundays, exceeding Lent by one. The last three Sundays of Easter bring us the conversations of Jesus with his disciples recorded in the Gospel of John just before his arrest, trial, and crucifixion. These are important words to hear as they are still instructions we need for our journey of faith with Jesus.

On May 6, from John 15, we hear Jesus describe to us to kind of intimate connection we have with him. He is a vine, and we are branches bearing fruit. We cannot bear fruit unless we are connected, and the fruit we bear must be of the same stuff of which Jesus is made. Jesus names this fruit "love." Because he is loving, we are too.

On May 13, again in John 15, Jesus gets specific and commands that we love each other as he has loved us. That is his commandment to us. And he knows what it means to love us, for he laid down his life for his friends. We are his friends, chosen by him to go and bear the fruit of love. John's gospel is very specific in connecting Jesus' love to his offered life. His death is testimony to how much he loves us; he is willing to die for us!

May 20 is the 7th and last Sunday of Easter. The Gospel reading on this day is always from John, Chapter 17, called the great priestly prayer of Jesus. For what does Jesus pray, as he is about to die? For **us**, his disciples, and for our **unity** that gives a witness to the world of God's love and care for all humanity.

Come and be involved in the lively worship of the Assembly gathered around and celebrating the risen presence of Jesus in Word, Meal, prayer and song. This is the heart of our life together. What we do here speaks to us and to the community about our willingness to engage the context of our culture with an alternative vision of what is really important.

God bless our continuing celebration of Christ's risen presence in our assembly.

Sierra Pacific Synod Assembly in May

Now that we are an ELCA congregation and pastor, we are able to participate in the life of the next level of the church: the Synod Assembly. The ELCA has three "expressions:" the congregation, the synod, and the church-wide. Synod is the administration of about 200 regional congregations in the northern California and Church-wide is the national Nevada area. administration of all the congregations of the ELCA in the U.S.A.

Our participation is through our pastor and our delegate to the Synod Assembly. There we will elect people to serve on the Synod Council, pass a Synod budget for the next fiscal term, and act on important resolutions that shape our Synod's ministry for the future.

Pastor Koch and Herm Weyland will represent Good Shepherd at the Synod Assembly this year. In addition, our congregation and pastor will be welcomed into the ELCA on Friday afternoon, May 18th, during the first business session. The Synod Assembly will open with a Eucharist Worship beginning at 1 pm. The first business session will follow at 2:15 pm. 6th on the agenda is the welcoming of congregations, including us! At 4:15 is the Assembly Keynote address, and at 7 pm, after district elections, there is a banquet. The cost for the banquet is \$50/person for those who wish to stay. Let Pastor know if you'll attend the banquet by May 4 or sooner for an accurate count. The Assembly theme this year is "For the Love of God: Caring for Creation."

TIMES OF TRANSITION: THE ONLY CONSTANT IS CHANGE

The only sure things are death and taxes, is the old saying. Now the new "old saying" is the only constant is change. We have made some changes at Good Shepherd in leaving Missouri Synod and joining Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. It was a change over which we had great control. It was completely our action and We freely began the process of choice. discerning where we belong, freely asked questions of our special visitors who came to us to speak about our choice, and finally, we freely voted to leave the LC-MS and join This was a change that we the ELCA. managed, took charge of, and controlled.

Other changes come to us over which we have no control. We have to adapt without having the choice. We can try to anticipate the changes, we can read forecasts about what might come our way, but we don't really have control. We may feel victimized by these unwanted changes and resist making the adaptations that are required to continue to move ahead. But we must adapt, or else we may not survive. We have very little control over the declining interest in participation in organized religion in our country, for example.

There are some things over which we have great control and other things over which we have very little control. The wisdom is to know the difference, and to take appropriate action.

We may be able to control our choice of denominational affiliation, but we may not be able to control declining membership in our congregations, for example. Just by joining the ELCA, we *may* have increased our potential for growth. There are 57,000 ELCA Lutherans in the Sierra Pacific Synod of the ELCA compared to 33,000 Lutherans in the California-Nevada-Hawaii District of

the LC-MS. However, unless we are a welcoming, and hospitable warm congregation, we will not grow. We have to make some decisions, as a congregation, individuals, concerning and as invitational presence in this community. What are you, personally, doing to help our congregation be a healthy, welcoming community of faithful Christians in Gilroy? Your personal invitation is the most important thing you can do to help us grow. People mostly join churches because they are invited by a friend or a relative to While there are some walk-in attend. visitors, those types are becoming fewer and farther between.



We have important outreach ministries at Good Shepherd: our Vineyard Preschool, our work with St. Josephs Family ministries, our Lutheran World Relief participation in projects like Baskets of Promise.
